Katherine founded an organization called Mindful Exchanges, which offered virtual mental health seminars in the midst

of the pandemic. In the summer of 2021, with MMF support, the Mindful Exchanges team was delighted to host in-person programming for the first time for children ages 6-14 at the Boys & Girls Club of New Haven. Notes Katherine, "With the various age groups, personalities, and perspectives, I learned early on that different kids absorb and engage with our lesson material best in different ways; what resonates from our lessons with each kid is unique to them. This experience fueled my desire to enter medical school with a focus on exploring the role of mental health in overall health. I aim to keep spreading mental health education to youth with Mindful Exchanges, increasing health equity through mental wellness."

PERFORMING ARTS, EDUCATION

Michael Gancz



A musician and composer, Michael spent the summer of 2021 enrolled in three music composition

conferences: the Summer Institute for Contemporary Performance Practice (SICPP), the Sō Percussion Summer Institute (SōSI), and the Ostrava Days New and Experimental Music Institute and Festival. As Michael reflects, "Each conference served as a focal point for the development not only of my compositional practice but also my qualities as a person." From one

conference, Michael "learned to think about instruments not as soundmaking abstracts, but as a meeting point of cultural, environmental, and personal factors." After attending another composition conference, Michael's horizons grew even further, as he observed, "The experience makes me think that I'd like to write more virtual and interactive compositions that make musical experimentalism accessible through the familiar aesthetics of video games and appspossibly even as a means of developing novel forms of pediatric music therapy!" Channeling his learning experiences into an original composition for the Yale Symphony Orchestra, Michael notes, "I still don't know what sound world it will end up in, but I know it'll reflect forms of introspection and community awareness that I couldn't have imagined before this summer."

CANCER RESEARCH

Medha Majety



The MMF Fellowship enabled Medha to spend her summer conducting cancer research at the Sidi Chen Lab at Yale.

Reflecting on her fellowship, Medha observes, "Overall, this summer was incredibly rewarding and a huge learning experience for me. It taught me valuable lessons and I learned that research not only involves replicating an experiment several times, but also doing several assays to validate the result and strike out any chance of luck or coincidence. I also learned that research involves a lot of troubleshooting and planning, such as when we ran into the hurdles in my projects. Academic and career-wise, my plans still remain the same – to study and

understand cancer from a clinical and research setting. I gained a lot of insight on the intricate mechanisms of cancer research this summer."

CANCER RESEARCH



Onyedikachi "Oby" Uche

Conducting cancer research in the laboratory of Dr. Shirin Bahmanyar at Yale, Oby's project

focused on characterizing the role of the protein phosphatase CTDNEP1 in regulating lipid homeostasis in cancer cells. In his own words, Oby conveys the power of the fellowship, writing, "Since the day I began this project, my experience has been incredible. I learned so much about not only the science behind my project and the laboratory techniques I have employed to investigate it, but also about what goes into being a researcher. Something I've considered for a while now is going to graduate school and pursuing a career in research, and this experience has really shown me what to expect. In summary, I can't say enough about how valuable the experience of working on this project has been to me. Not only has this project given me insight into the workings of a research career and expanded my knowledge as a science student, but it has also been very rewarding, as it addresses the incredibly significant issue of cancer and has the potential to produce some very impactful results."

CANCER RESEARCH

Mathew Krick Mathew's summer research project at the Halene Laboratory at the Yale Cancer Center focused on investigating the role

of genetic mutations and their association with blood malignancies, such as Myelodysplastic Syndromes and Acute Myeloid Leukemia. Looking back on his summer fellowship, Mathew notes, "Throughout the summer, I learned several valuable critical thinking, technical, and personal lessons. I learned how scientific research can be both challenging, but nevertheless, with consistency, it is

Dream Yard

Music has been such a critical aspect of helping people cope with the pandemic and DreamYard was a great resource for over 10 schools in the Bronx. Through their musicals, music production and career pathways work, DY fulfilled short-term need and drove long-term, systemic changes.
